

Motorcycle Racing Program To Be Held Here Sunday

'SPROUTS' ELDER PICKED TO LEAD FIELD OF THIRTY

Champion Doped To Have Tough Competition, However, In Several Events

More than thirty riders will compete at the Modesto Junior College Stadium Sunday afternoon in a program of dirt track motorcycle races, sponsored by the Stanislaus County unit of the California Highway Patrol. The affair is scheduled to start at 2:30 o'clock.

Proceeds will go to a fund for widows and orphans of the patrol, according to Captain A. A. Morrison of the Stanislaus unit.

Elder To Race
Heading the list of entries will be Lloyd "Sprouts" Elder, national and international short-track champion.

He has gained a reputation throughout the United States and Europe, where he has set various records and won many short-track races.

In last September's racing event here, Elder won two races, the handicap and trench sprints, set a lap record, and barely lost a special match race to Cordy Milne of Hollywood. On the last turn in the final dash, Elder over-ran the track and spilled. He righted himself quickly, and came in just a shade behind the Southern Californian.

Master On Curves
Elder is a master on the curves and when he loses ground in the straightaway, he more than makes up for it on the turns.

Partly because he defeated the champion in last year's match race, and because he has been giving a real run in other racing programs this year, Milne is favored to press Elder considerably Sunday. He will team with Wilbur Lamoreaux and other outstanding riders in attempting to dethrone Elder.

The two feature races of the day will be a four-lap handicap event, with several of the contestants starting at scratch, and a mile scratch race.

Besides the two events, there will be numerous special match races, as well as some track record attempts.

Stunt Riding, Too
Duke Mossman of Hollywood will enter a stunt show, including and feature tricks. One of his special events will be a juggling act in which he will juggle eggs while standing on his motorcycle at forty-five miles per hour.

Mossman also will leap hindfolded over an assistant, according to plans.

The Hollywood stunt man plans to enter various races and his intent is to set a track record, he told Captain Morrison.

Last Sunday the major portion of the forty riders who will compete here attracted a crowd of 10,000 in Stockton.

Monday predicts an attendance area greater than that of last fall at the races to-morrow.

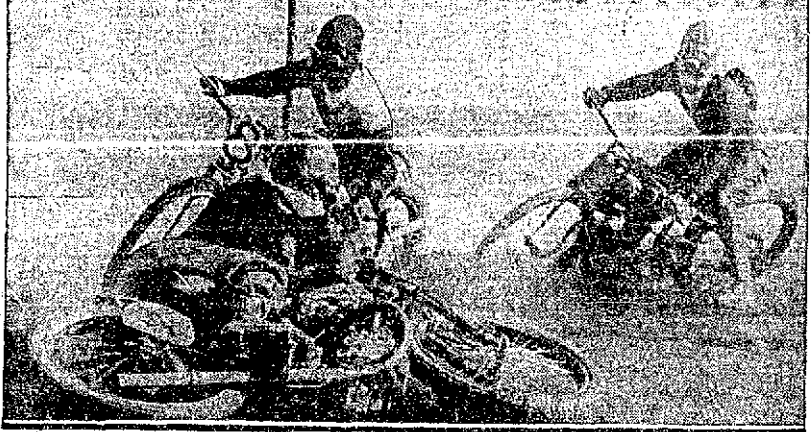

Dempsey Wants Sharkey To Beat Primo Carnera

Victory For Champion Would Give Promoter Jack Match Between Baer and Titleholder; Schmeling Offers \$50,000 For Return Bout

NEW YORK, June 10.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey will lead the cheering for a bitter rival of his own fighting days when Jack Sharkey defends the heavyweight championship here June 29.

The old Manassa Mauler has nothing against Carnera but he'd much prefer to see Sharkey win and this open the way for Dempsey to capitalize to the fullest extent on the popularity Max Baer achieves through his sensational knockout of Max Schmeling Thursday night.

With the Carnera match, Sharkey's contract with Madison Square Garden will expire and the Boston sailor will be free to do business with any promoter he likes. Dempsey is certain that a match with Baer, either in September or next year will outdraw any other that could be made. Sharkey is known to be willing to listen, at least, to what Dempsey has to offer.

Baer Willing
Baer definitely is aligned in the old champion's camp. "He's my pal," the big Californian says. "I'll fight for Jack any time, anywhere. He just has to say when there's any chance of a fight for either of us. Of course Carnera can throw a monkey wrench into all these arrangements. Should the Italian succeed in beating Sharkey in Long Island City, Baer would lose all chance of a fight for either of us. At least for a year, Carnera is under contract to the Garden for that period and could not do business with Dempsey unless Jack and the Garden formed an alliance. The possibility of that was regarded as remote.

But Dempsey is doing no real worrying over the situation. He already has booked Baer for a barnstorming tour, starting at Buffalo next Friday night, and has under consideration a return match with Schmeling.

Schmeling's Offer
The German, complaining that the heat had prevented him from fighting anywhere in the last week, offered to "beat \$50,000 or my share of the receipts that Baer can't do it again."

To that offer Dempsey replied: "I certainly would like to do it all over again, but I don't know how Baer feels about it. He considers Schmeling a dead bird now and he is after live game."

Baer was busy escorting his fiancée, June Knight, musical comedy star around town. They expect to get married, Max said, when his divorce decree is made final.

Baer's barnstorming tour starting at Buffalo will take him to Chicago, St. Louis, Denver, Seattle, Portland, Ore., San Francisco and Los Angeles. Dempsey will go along with the tour, but has no share in the receipts that Baer can't do it again.

After competing at Wimbledon Vines will join the other members of the cup team, Wilmer Allison, Harold Schmidt will start on the Modesto mound. Ross Ellam will pitch for the Modestans.

GOODMAN WINS U. S. OPEN GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

Young Omaha Amateur Shoots Brilliantly To Capture Title

NORTH SHORE CLUB, Glenview, Ill., June 10.—(AP)—Johnny Goodman, 23-year-old Omaha amateur, won the U. S. Open golf championship of the United States to-day in a dramatic finish when Ralph Guldahl, 21-year-old St. Louis professional, missed a four foot putt on the last green for a tie.

Goodman won by a single stroke with a seventy-two hole total of 297, one shot of the all time record, while Guldahl finished with 288.

Guldahl, closing in fast on Goodman as the Nebraska amateur slipped to a 76 on his final round, came up to the last hole needing a par four to tie for the championship and force the issue to a playoff to-morrow. He put his second shot in a trap, then recovered beautifully but finally missed the last critical putt, from only four feet.

The victory for Goodman, first amateur since Ben Jones to score the national open, brought him a record smashing tournament prize of \$1000.

Guldahl, the best of the professionals, closed the 1800 ft. prize money, while the gold medal went to
