"You're crazy," said the fellow with the whiskey streak. "That Johnson had a yellow streak."

"So he had a yellow streak, eh? Where was it? Who ever found it? Johnson got up at four, walked straight into Ketchel, and grabbing him by the shoulders, picked him up like a baby. Ketchel was as mad as a cat, but Jack just talked soothing talk to him."

"Could Lodi Do That?" "And he did, too. Do you think Lodi could have done that to Stanley? Ketchel would have torn his head off. As for Louis licking the Seals, you wouldn't have hit him once every ten days."

The big fellow with the beer in his hand who was so hot for Johnson was Walter Monaghan of Chicago, who since 1906 has traveled the world for the cards and always with a fighter. A fighter himself, at first, he quit it to train and manage. And he had some of the best, including Willard. In fact, it was Walter who trained big Jess for the fight with the knocked-out Johnson for the title. But Walter doesn't like to talk of that one. Asked about it, he said "Jess was a good guy—a lot better fighter than you think," and let it go at that.

Walter Monaghan, the trainer and blue professional prizefighter camp to the south of Palm Beach and Southampton, is one of the few who still remember the fight with the blue book youngsters in the South, and the Summer finds him continuing his lessons at Newport and Southampton.

Somebody asked Walter to name his all-time fighting lineup, from the heavies to the flys.

"That's easy. Just put Johnson as the heavyweight, Fitz at 175, Langford as the middle, Walcott as the welter, and the kid who was a dead-end puncher I ever saw. Killed three guys in the ring with his left hand."

St. Louis Cards, Behind Paul Dean's Good Pitching, Defeat Chicago Cubs

Of seven games played in the major leagues yesterday, five were won by the simple stratagem of hitting the ball over the barriers and trotting around with the winning margins.

Frank Greenberg hit his thirty-first circuit ball of the season, over the score board with Gehring on base, to give Detroit a victory over the White Sox 4-3.

At Forbes Field in Pittsburgh, Rookie Bud Hefey, who is batting .143, hit one over the score board, and the Pirates rode on that lone smash to a 1-0 victory over Cincinnati. The hit, by the nephew of the one great Bud Hefey, came in the sixth inning to break up a pitching duopoly between Bill Swift of the Pirates and young Albert Hollingsworth, Red pitcher.

Travis Jackson assumed the hero role in Philadelphia when he stepped to the plate in the ninth with Hank Leiber on base, smote one mightily and gave the league-leading New York Giants a 3-2 decision over the Phillies. The triumph, coupled with the defeat of the Chicago Cubs by the Cardinals, increased the Giants' lead over Chicago to three games.

Stage Rally Tony Cuccinello provided the homer that climaxed a four-run rally in the ninth and gave the Brooklyn Dodgers a 8-5 win over the Boston Braves. The Dodgers led until the eighth when Johnny Babich weakened and went to the showers as the Braves sent three runs across the plate.

Red Rolfe was the man of the hour as the Yankees shaded the Philadelphia Athletics but sharing the laurels in this contest was John (Glory) Ryan who came back to the city of his first triumph to touch off the rally that led to a Yankee victory.

Cards Storm Wins The St. Louis Cards defeated the Cubs, 3-1, behind the six-hit pitching of Paul Dean. Joe Medwick hit a homer in this game but it was made with none on and the Cards would have won without it.

Dean chalked up his thirteenth victory of the season as the Cards took second place by a margin of three points, 614 to 611. Cleveland defeated the St. Louis Browns, 5-3, as Brown rallies went for naught in the eighth and ninth innings.

TILMAN DEFEATS MATMAN FENTON The Canadian finished the first pin in 11:29 with his famous—and about his only legitimate hold—drop-kick. Tilman came back with a rush to pin Rod in seven-seconds and with a flying tackle and a body slam.
