

Observer Thinks Army Lacks Punch Of Previous Years

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(INS)—The great mystery which currently confounds the football fanatics breathlessly awaiting next Saturday's Army-Notre Dame clash centers around the Cadets' recent lack of high explosives. To what extent has Army been pulling its punches in recent games?

Some of the observers who knowingly discuss these things insist Army has been "going all out" and simply lacks the steamroller wallop of the war years, with the result the high riding Notre Dame will get even for some recent indignities.

You can take either of two facts for the basis of either side of the argument. Army while being held to comparative low scores of late has never been seriously threatened and therefore was content to coast in.

Used Stars Through Game
On the other hand you can point out with Notre Dame coming up a safer procedure would have been to pile it on early and save the stand-out players. Last Saturday, when Army trimmed West Virginia 24 to 0, Davis, Blanchard and Tucker of the backfield went nearly all the way.

The three famed backs were not relieved until approximately the last 15 minutes.

Down in Baltimore, to present a complete picture, Notre Dame used everybody except the third string water boy in running up its greatest score in history against a Navy team—28 to 0. It could have been twice as bad.

Notre Dame did not open up with its entire bag of tricks against Navy for the simple reason the best of its legions will be put on display for the whole world when Army meets the Fighting Irish on Saturday at the University of Southern California.

Victory Highlights
Highlights of the victories by the eleven which will actually clash for the mythical national championship next Saturday included:

Army—Touchdowns scored in first period by short pass, Tucker to Foldsberg; in the second period on a 46 yard gallop by Blanchard and in the third period on a pass, Tucker to Davis. West Virginia scored in first period on a 52 yard punt, Tucker to Davis. Army scored in fourth period on a 56 yard march, capped by Gempers' two yard plunge.

Both Missed Scores
Army missed one touchdown on a dropped pass in the end zone and Notre Dame had one called back. The teams fumbled more than usual and played what seemed to be a little more raggedly than in other recent starts, but outcome of neither game was ever in doubt. The favorites scored early and late and stopped threats as fast as they developed.

Army is expected to go into next Saturday's game in top shape, while Notre Dame has several players on the injured list, and some of the doubtful starters.

Irish Have Casualties
SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 4.—(INS)—Notre Dame football practice today featured a week of strenuous practice today for next Saturday's game with Army with the prospect of losing two, maybe three, of its star linemen.

This was revealed yesterday by Coach Leahy as he led his Irish squad back from Baltimore, where it beat Navy Saturday. Leahy said guard Bob McBride and tackle Zyggy Czarski probably will not be in shape to play against Army. McBride has a severe ankle sprain and it is feared Czarski may have a chipped bone in his hip.

Also on the doubtful playing list is Frank Strohmeyer, the team's center. Strohmeyer suffered an injury to his right foot, which was broken last year while he was in military service.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—(INS)—The Chicago Bears are drawing away from the field in the western division of the National Football League, but the eastern section is in knots with a triple tie for first place among the New York Giants, Philadelphia Eagles and Pittsburgh Steelers.

Philadelphia tripped up New York, 24 to 14, as the butter fingered Giants muffed many scoring opportunities. These two teams will clash again in New York Sunday in the leading game of the day.

Each Bears Interceptor, Pittsburgh beat the Washington Redskins, 14 to 7, by intercepting two of Sammy Baugh's passes.

Boston's hapless Yanks lost their sixth straight when they bowed to the Chicago Cardinals, 28 to 14.

The Bears strengthened their hold on first place in the eastern section of the league by beating Green Bay, 10 to 7. The champion Los Angeles Rams took second place away from Green Bay by grubbing the Detroit Lions, 41 to 20, as Bob Waterfield led the attack with his passing and kicking.

Waterfield, most valuable player in the league last year, had one of his great days as he passed for three touchdowns, ran for five, kicked two field goals and threw two extra points in the easy Los Angeles victory. He completed 15 of 29 passes for 224 yards and added other yardage running. Despite a rainstorm, 36,777 fans were in Briggs Stadium to watch the 1945 champions meet a Lion eleven which has not won a game this year.

Dons Whip Browns
In the rival All American Conference, the once fabulous Cleveland Browns got upset again when the Los Angeles Dons nosed them out in the final quarter, 17 to 16.

The Browns still head the western division, however.

The Los Angeles Dons won Joe Aguirre's field goal with 20 seconds to play.

The New York Yankees, pace setters in the eastern division, narrowly missed being tripped up by the tail end Miami Seahawks. Only the passing and running of the veteran Ace Parker brought a 24 to 21 victory to New York with just 26 seconds left to play.

Hanson Will Put Crown On Block
Billy Hanson, popular wrestler from Utah, who toppled Bronko Nagurski and took the Pacific Coast heavyweight championship in Fresno last Saturday night, will risk the crown in Ryan's Auditorium this Saturday night.

Hanson has signed to defend the title against Tony Martinielli, Pittsburgh Italian and former Fordham University footballer. Martinielli made the challenge after Fraley declined a rematch with Martinielli who last week dropped Harry Kent, big Oregon grappler. Martinielli and Fraley waged a hectic draw here a week ago.

Hanson's victory over the favored Nagurski provided the Fresno fans with the first coast championship crown exchange in the history of the game here.

Nine Teams Lose Unbeaten Status
NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(INS)—Pennsylvania, Harvard and seven other college football teams were erased from the list of unbeaten and untied eleven over the weekend, leaving 20 schools with perfect gridiron records.

The Penn Quakers lost 17 to 14 to a so so Princeton squad in the biggest upset of the season. Harvard fell 13 to 9 to a rugged Rutgers eleven.

Other teams that suffered first defeats included Bradley, St. Olaf, Washburn, Wabash, Guilford and St. Lawrence. New Britain (Conn.) Teachers was dropped from the select circle because of a 6 to 6 tie with Lowell Textile.

Army's 19 to 0 triumph over West Virginia was the Cadets' seventh victory in the year and their twenty fifth over three seasons. Another school with a long string of wins is Delaware with seven this year and an unbroken chain of 27 contests. Delaware defeated Franklin and Marshall Saturday, 28 to 0.
