## PACKERS ARE SET FOR ALL-STARS AT CHICAGO TONIGHT

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Green Bay's Packers, current last word in professional football accomplishment, will take their turn on the spot against selected college talent tonight before 85,000 fans at Soldier field in the fourth annual all-star gridiron spectacle.

The Packers, like the Chicago Bears and Detroit Lions, their predecessors in football's biggest one-night stand, will defend the prestige of professional football against the collegiate brand. The All-stars, sixty-five huskies selected by more than 5,000,000 fans as the brightest stars of the 1936 college season, will be defending only their individual reputations, leaving most of the pressure on the professionals.

Charles E. (Gus) Dorais of the University of Detroit, a specialist in forward passing, who also was selected by the fans to head the all-star coaching staff, has drilled his squad for 17 days, with most of the offensive sessions devoted to an aerial game built around "Slingshot Sam" Baugh, Texas Christian's great sharpshooter. He has a host of other flingers at his disposal, notably Ray Bulvid of Marquette, Vernon Huffman of Indiana, and Big Sam Francis of Nebraska, but apparently has decided to leave the victory or defeat question up to Baugh.

Dorais will start the first eleven men named by the fans — a lineup which did not include Baugh — but after the opening kickoff will be at liberty to make his appearance without much delay. The all-star team which will be out there at the kickoff includes four members of the 1936 all-America, Gaynell Tinsley of Louisiana State, end; Ed Widseth, Minnesota tackle; Max Starcevic of Washington, guard; Averell Danzell of Pittsburgh, the other tackle, and Francis.

The Packers, who mowed through their professional opposition last year with a combination of slambang running offense and a great passing game manned by Arnie Herber and Don Hutson, will line up with Hank Bruden, former Northwestern star, at quarterback; Herber and George Sauer, all-America fullback from Nebraska in 1933, at the halfback positions, and Clark Hinkle of Bucknell, kicking ace, at fullback.

More than 40 of the collegians already are under contract to professional clubs, and the other 20-odd will have chances to earn belated opportunities in the cash-and-carry game.

In case of rain, the game will be postponed until tomorrow night.

## Nevada Gridiron Situation Looks Brighter as Veteran Players Return to School

New strength will greet Coach Doug Dashiell as he steps on Mackay field a week from tomorrow to officially begin directing the University of Nevada grid eleven in preparations for a strenuous 1937 season. Doug has been directing the conditioning drills since practice started last week but has held no practice in formations, in keeping with regulations set up by the Far Western conference.

While things looked somewhat gloomy late last week with few of the handful of veterans he had left from last year returning, the Dashiell grin had a new lift yesterday. Big Tex McKinnon, from whom much is expected in end play, showed up on the field and said he would take out his uniform today. Word was received from Bill Grubbs, veteran halfback, that that luminary will be on hand next week. John Radovich, from whom much is expected, also took out football togs yesterday.

With these three ready to put in a season at football, Dashiell and Chet Seranton will have their work cut out for them sifting out the best material from a squad of fifty-three players, only nine of whom are lettermen. An additional eleven players were squandered from last year, although many of them saw no action in actual games. Sixteen of the candidates saw service on the freshman team last year, or the year before. Four are junior college transfers and most of the rest participated in spring practice.

Letterman taking part in the conditioning drill are: Sam Basta, Neal Campbell, Pat Eaton, Jim Twombly, John Robb, Kenneth Powell, Joe Lommori, with McKinnon reporting today and Grubbs next week.

Most of the berths on the team are left wide open, particularly in the line, by the absence of lettermen. Basta, Campbell and McKinnon are ends, and Eaton, Twombly, Robb, Powell and Grubbs are backs. Lommori is a guard.

With competition for every post expected to be close, the situation might assist in the development of high class ball players. Squads from last year who will be seeking berths include: Ted Demosthenes; center, John Gustafson; tackle, Charles Calhoun, end; Fred Gallo-way, end; Earl Brooks, guard; Jim Sullivan, tackle; and Bob Metten, Dick Taylor, Harry Gravelle, Don Brandon, and Willie Dale, backs.

## CHICAGO RETURNS TO LEAGUE TOP AS GIANTS LOSE

Bill Terry long since has discovered that, when his ball club is in the thick of the pennant scramble, it can look for little or no assistance from its neighbors on the far side of the Brooklyn bridge.

Three years ago Terry had the bitterest proof of that credo. In the last few games of the season, with the Giants and Cardinals in a "he's up—he's down" scrap for the bunting, the Dodgers invaded the Polo grounds and won the undying gratitude of their constituents by easing the Giants out and the Gas House into.

Now he's had a fresh example. His own outfit, of course, dropped an 8-1 verdict to the sixteen-hitting Cardinals yesterday. But even that wouldn't have wiped out their two-point first place margin if the Dodgers had hog-tied the Cubs.

The Dodgers, however, lost, 4-2, with the result that both series were resumed today with the standings revised thus:

Brooklyn, in fact, had quite an afternoon. Besides being thrown for a loss by Tex Carleton's eight-inning pitching, they lost Woody English, at least temporarily, with a sprained ankle and first baseman Buddy Hassett, one of the team's few consistent hitters, on a new play called "The managers bounce."

As put on by Burrell Grimes, it consists of storming onto the field when one of your players commits an error and yanking him right out of the game. Just what dividends it pays in player morale is problematical.

While the Cubs and Giants continue to go up and down on their personal see-saw, the American League has turned over the job of keeping its own things interesting to Rudy York, the back-stopping Indian.

It couldn't, obviously, have been given to anyone better. Rudy's latest fireworks display, set off in the chagrined faces of the Senators, consists of two homers and ten singles that accounted for seven runs, sufficient to wallop Washington, 12-3.

York thereby not only put himself right behind DiMaggio, Fox and Gehrig in the home run race at 30, but also bettered by one Babe Ruth's record of seventeen homers in one month. The Bam got that high on the way to his record 60 in September, 1927.

Meanwhile several neat pitching performances were written on the records. Danny MacFayden, with a three-hitter that stopped the Reds, 7-2, and Bucky Walters, with a 3-0, five-hit shutout of the Pirates, headed the list.

Bunap Hadley, aided by Gehrig's four-bagger with the bases full, beat the Indians for the Yankees, 7-3; the White Sox edged out the Red Sox, 7-6, and the Browns and Athletics split a double-header, St. Louis winning the first 2-1, the A's the night cap by 7-3.

## COLLINS TO MEET FRANK ROWSEL ON BRIDGE CARD

Ernie Collins will meet Frank Rowsel, outstanding P-100 coast light heavyweight, in a ten main event to head the bridge fiesta fight card here September 11. It was announced today by Promoter Frank Scaler. The bout will be staged in the afternoon at the race track.

Scaler said he tried every method he knew to persuade Young Corbett to come here for Collins, but that Corbett refused. The Fresno middleweight is also refusing other offers. He has not enjoyed good health since he beat Billie Conn . . . San Francisco recently, and turned down a \$6000 guarantee for a rematch in the East.

The local promoter said he was attempting to secure Johnny Basanelli and Young Tiger Wade in another ten-round bout as a semi-final to the Rowsel-Collins go.

Rowsel has an imposing record and will be the best fighter Collins has yet faced. He holds victories over such boys as Wesley Ketchell, Billie Donohue, Pietro Georgi, Fred Lenhart, Johnny Miller and LeRoy Brown. He was dethroned three times by Maxie Rosenbloom and has also fought John Henry Lewis, Able Feldman, Tiger Jack Fox and Ray Acus.

Rowsel will come here a week before the fight to do some training. After the bout he will go to New York to take part in the Mike Jacobs elimination tournament. He is handled by Walter Feldman, who once managed Primo Carnera.

## Joe Louis Injured Hand In Fight

DETROIT, Sept. 1.—(AP)—A defense of the heavyweight title against Max Schmeling this fall was announced as definitely out of the picture for Joe Louis today.

A rest of two months, possibly six, was recommended for Louis by physicians who studied X-ray photographs of the hands he injured in defending his title against Tommy Farr Monday night in New York.

No fracture was disclosed but the X-rays showed badly bruised muscles and tendons around the knuckles of the right hand and slightly less serious bruises on the left.

When the findings were telegraphed to John Roxborough, Louis' co-manager, in New York it was announced the Schmeling bout was definitely off for this fall.

"When I fight that boy I don't want to have to worry about my hands," said Joe. "I'll be glad to rest."

Dr. Chester C. Ames who studied the negatives said they explained fifteen rounds of one-handed fighting by Louis.

"The injuries to that right hand came from a crushing blow against a resisting object," Dr. Ames said.

Louis said he injured his right hand when he missed a blow and landed on top of Farr's head.

After Roxborough's return to Detroit Friday Louis will leave for the summer home of Julian Black, co-manager, near the Indiana-Michigan line.

## FALLON TO MEET LOVELOCK FOR BALL LEAGUE TITLE

FALLON, Nev., Sept. 1.—(Special)—The Lovelock and Fallon baseball teams, victors Sunday in a semi-final post-season playoff of the Western Nevada Amateur Baseball League, are to come together at Fallon Monday forenoon for the first of a series of games to decide the title-holder for the season.

The match here, starting at 10:30 on Labor Day at Fallon baseball park, has been arranged as one of the attractions during the three-day Fallon '49 show and rodeo which starts next Saturday.

The rodeo committee for the American Legion post of Churchill county, sponsor of the annual show, has placed a fund in the hands of the manager of the Fallon baseball club, part of which is to be turned over to the Lovelock manager on his expense account.

The Fallon team, which topped the league in percentage standing for the season, took Verd here Sunday in a close game which came near being a win for the visitors. The Melonpickers run in the ninth inning broke the tie.

Lovelock, which placed second in league standing, Sunday won a hard fought game over Smith Valley which gave the Pershing nine the right to enter the league finals.

Both Fallon and Lovelock teams have been rated from the beginning of the season as the two best in the league. Friendly rivalry between these clubs has been keen from the time early last year when they were very nearly evenly matched but with Lovelock having, then, the edge.

This first game of the league finals has been set for 10:30 in order to give '49 show visitors at Fallon time to stay to the end before the lunch hour and the opening of the last day of the rodeo at 1:30 p. m.

## '49 FIGHT CARD IS SCHEDULED AT FALLON

FALLON, Nev., Sept. 1.—(Special)—The fight card event to take place at the state fair grounds in Fallon during the '49 show and rodeo Saturday night, as a part of the annual event sponsored by Churchill Post, American Legion, will be made up of twenty-four rounds in six scheduled matches. It has been announced by H. A. Dudley, matchmaker, who has been promoting a series of bouts under auspices of the legion.

For the show fights a stage has been erected in front of the grandstand under huge lights to be installed.

Dudley says the main event will be between Eddie Davis of Fallon and Maxie Lockwood, Indian flash from Nixon. Both boys will weigh in at 155. They are fast and well-trained. Bets are about even on the outcome.

Red Johnson of Reno, and Andy Jack, a tough fighter from Stillwater, will meet in the semi-windup for four rounds. The boys, will weigh in at 155 and are speedy.

Fight fans are looking forward to a grudge fight between Virgil Ruelh, Kentucky boy, at 190 pounds, who is an enrollee at CCC Camp Carson River, and Frank Suchanek, 187, an enrollee of the neighboring Camp Newlands. This will be a fight to the finish—as many two-minute rounds as it takes for one of the heavies to keep the floor for the count.

Lloyd Whalen of Fallon, 185 and six feet tall, with a reach to match, and Kid Guerilla, Stillwater Indian, ten pounds heavier and an inch shorter, will meet in one of the preliminaries.

Not matched in weight, but the lighter boy making up in punch and speed, are those slated for another preliminary, Martin Green of Nixon, 165, and Ed Baker of Fallon, 185. This promises to be an even scrap despite Green's twenty-pound handicap.

Fred Kenison, 135, of Schurz, and Mike Kresella, 135, a Missouri boy, now a member of one of the Fallon CCC camps, will put on a preliminary that some say will be a draw.

The Ross-Collins fight will be a highlight of the annual three-day rodeo celebration and has the fight fans in and around Winnemucca in a betting spree.

While Pert Ross is bound to be the favorite in the wagers he is facing the fight of his life. His title will be at stake and he is expected to make a stubborn defense of his highly prized belt. Both boys entered into heavy training last night and are expected to be in the pink of condition at fight time.

The fights will be staged in the evening beginning at eight o'clock.
